

EDUCATIONAL INITIATIVE EXPANDS TO HIGH SCHOOL & RECEIVES COMMUNITY FUNDING

From the inception of the Foundation's efforts to provide education about adulteration, unintended adverse effects, and unforeseen long-term consequences associated with recreational drug use, it was clear the value of this information extended beyond the initial target audience of 18-35 year olds. Although this age group comprises the single largest age-cohort of recreational drug ingestion and exposure, they are by no means unique.

Specifically, it has long been known that highschool-age individuals, and younger, often have significant opportunities to engage in recreational drug use. Nonetheless, because of their status as legal minors, and the widespread proliferation of social taboos and qualms related to addressing this age-group's drug usage frankly and directly, there are often institutional barriers to instituting public health measures and harm reduction education related to their recreational drug use.

Against this background, the Foundation strategically determined not to pursue reaching individuals aged 18 and younger until our Educational Initiative had achieved a durable body of experience with providing education to and with individuals, institutions, and outside partners for those aged 18 and older. In 2021, having achieved this stage of organizational and operational maturity, we began to cautiously pursue opportunities for working with high school students.

Our efforts have gratifyingly been met with an excellent record of support, encouragement, funding, and partnership during this past year. We've received grants and assistance in outreach for working with and educating high school students in Highland Park from the Grainger Foundation, Healthcare Foundation of Highland Park, and the Community Foundation of Highland Park. Their material assistance, institutional heft, and votes of confidence will allow us for the first time to bring lifesaving education to those aged 18 and younger.

Likewise, through a partnership with Steve Douglass and the New Media Program at Lake Forest High School (Greg's alma mater) we've seen overwhelming enthusiasm for the Foundation's real-world approach to recreational drug education from high school students themselves. When given the opportunity to create media and video messaging on the Foundation's behalf, using original footage provided by the Foundation, the extent of the voluntary response to participate happily surprised all involved. Against expectations that a small percentage totaling perhaps three to five students would elect to get involved we were thrilled when nearly the entire class of more than twenty five students decided to dedicate themselves to the project.

With these encouraging beginnings we're very much looking forward to continuing to educate and engage with this vital age group.

THIRD CLASS OF FELLOWS

The GPF Foundation welcomed its third class of fellows from Rosalind Franklin University of Medicine and Science in 2021. This program gives these Chicago Medical School graduate students in medicine, pharmacology, psychology and psychiatry opportunities to interact with advanced practitioners in their fields while furthering the mission of the GPF Foundation.

This year's group is comprised of four medical students who are concentrating on psychiatry and other non-psychiatric specializations. They all share a strong interest in reaching and educating college age and younger individuals about how to navigate encounters with recreational substances. This common goal has lead them, and GPFF Intern Alec Casey, to take the lead on researching and assessing the full-range of programmatic options available to the Foundation.

In line with the Foundation's commitment to evidence-based programming they are reviewing not only the core programs for recreational drug safety and education, but also multiple studies of these programs' efficacy as they help identify options for the future of the Foundation's work.



Alaa Hajeissa - 2021 Fellow Alaa is a is a fourth year medical student at the Chicago Medical School who will be working within psychiatry with the goal of subspecializing in Child-Adolescent Psych. Since college Alaa has had a fascination with how drugs affect individuals and communities. IRB STUDY OF EDUCATIONAL PROGRAM ENTERS PHASE 2

The longitudinal study of the GPF Foundation's educational programming completed its first phase in 2021. This initial part of the study focused on the efficacy of the programming as delivered via a remote online format. Although this modality was a practical necessity due to the constraints of the pandemic, this method of distribution has broad applicability for the Foundation's ability to deliver programming across the country and world.

The second phase of the study will assess the performance of the educational program in an in-person setting. The insights delivered from this phase will directly strengthen our ability to educate program participants in high schools, colleges, libraries, athletic organizations and other groups in and around Lake and Cook County and geographies further afield as the Foundation's capacity grows.

Presentation of the findings from both phases, and a comparison of the two methods of

presentation, will be submitted to national and international conferences and papers of psychology, behavioral science and emergency medicine. We look forward to the results of this study and the opportunity to engage



opportunity to engage Dr. Steven Miller with educators and scientists from around the world to share findings and learn from their related bodies of work.

DISEASE-A-MONTH TEAM GROWS -WILL FORM BASIS FOR CLINICAL DECISION-MAKING TOOL

With Disease-A-Month now ranking in the top 25% of all medical journals in the world in terms of impact score the opportunity for the GPF Foundation to globally inform and influence the



practice of medicine related to MDMAinduced emergencies has grown significantly. The potential that comes from being part of a highly respected reference

tool for primary care practitioners has lead us to bring on-board additional authors and reviewers who can help ensure this edition starts filling in the "blind spot" in medicine.

Specifically, given that even for seasoned professionals awareness of the signs, symptoms and sequelae related to MDMA-induced psychosis may not be widespread, or salient, we've found it vital to bring onto the authorship and review team doctors and psychiatrists who do have specific clinical experience with these patients. Their input will help relate to their global colleagues not only the clinical characteristics to watch for but also how these relate to the basic science underlying what they may experience. Dr. Jerrold Leikin (Editor-In-Chief) has emphasized the unique and important role of Disease-A-Month in conveying to practitioners the fundamental bases of medical and scientific knowledge in which all evidence-based clinical practices have their origin. Especially when treating relatively novel, or not-often-seen, conditions this basic understanding is essential and can make the difference between a correct or incorrect differential diagnosis.

The comprehensive review of literature necessary to provide this essential information and perspective has also been identified by the **GPF** Foundation's **Medical Initiative** Architect, Dr. Jim Dolan, as the necessary

pre-requisite for building of an evidencebased clinical decision making tool to likewise help inform and guide clinical practice. With this in mind, as work proceeds on this edition of Disease-A-Month, we are excited to be developing a thorough compendium and reference for the treatment of MDMA-related outcomes that bring patients into contact with their primary care and other medical providers.

MEDICAL SIMULATIONS ARE POISED TO SUPPORT CRITICAL CARE CLOSE TO HOME & EDUCATE DOCTORS INTERNATIONALLY

This year has seen remarkable development of our medical simulations. First, for context, at this point last year we had completed a single script that was peer-reviewed and had excellent promise but was yet to be put into a format for teaching medical students and professionals. One year later we have two complete interactive simulations, with each addressing a different part of patient care related to adverse effects from MDMA or adulterated MDMA.

In addition to these we also have a third completed script with immense promise for indepth learning about managing the partnership between primary care and psychiatry in long-term treatment of drug-induced psychosis, including good possibilities for providing CME accreditation.

With funding from the Healthcare Foundation of Highland Park, Illinois and guidance from ER Dr. Ron Himmelman and ER Chief Doctor Ernie Wang, both at NorthShore University HealthCare, we are working on implementing the ER script as a quality-improvement tool and as part of an IRBapproved study at Highland Park Hospital.

Likewise, under the guidance of Vice President for Interprofessional Education and Simulation at Rosalind Franklin University, Jim Carlson and with Dr. Robin Dyer as the case author based roughly on Greg Friedman's experience with a primary care practitioner, we are also now preparing to launch a primary care treatment simulation on the internationally used medical

teaching application Full Code.

AN EVENING OF EXPLORATION

An Evening of Exploration welcomed 150 live and approximately 300 virtual guests to Northmoor Country Club in Highland Park to enjoy the evening, update supporters, and raise funds relating to the GPF Foundation's (GPFF) mission.

Emceed by WGN Morning News anchor Larry Potash, the event provided the crowd with an overview of the Foundation's current initiatives and an opportunity to hear from a range of GPFF stakeholders, including its founders, interns, fellows, board of directors, and medical professionals involved in its work, most notably Dr. Jerrold B. Leiken, the recipient of the GPF Foundation Harm Reduction Award. ONGOING SUPPORT & GROWTH OF NEW RELATIONSHIPS






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
